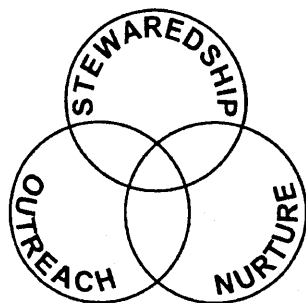

## SPIRITUAL OLYMPIANS

I want to thank you for your response to my recent sermon of the same title. Some thought that those who were not here or do not have access to the internet might benefit from the highlights.

Certainly, the United States is doing well in the Summer Olympics in Greece. The Olympics inspired the title, but the real inspiration came from the scripture reading from Hebrews 12:1 *"let us run with perseverance the race set before us,"* St. Paul uses several images from sports as metaphors for the Christian journey of faith. We know that becoming an Olympian is a great honor that is earned by the athletes who compete. Imagine all the people who participate in any particular sport. Then there are thousands who could actually be called athletes.

True athletes know and study everything they can about their sport. They are knowledgeable about the rules, techniques and strategy needed to be a winner in the sport. They condition themselves mentally, physically, and spiritually to be ready for anything that may be required of them. They also practice their skills constantly. Athletes put all of this to the test in actual competition with skillful opponents to refine their skills and win the prize.

Then there are Olympians. They are the best of the best. Imagine the thousands of athletes who competed for positions of their nations Olympic team and lost. Then consider the hundreds of Olympians who are eliminated at the Olympic games until only three medal winners remain; Gold, Silver and Bronze. Few people ever remember the non-medal winners.

I think Paul used the athletic metaphor to challenge us as Christians to understand that we are in a race against evil. If we are to win that race against evil we must run the race with perseverance that is set before each of us. Paul tells us in Ephesians 6: 12 *"For we are not contending against flesh and blood, but*

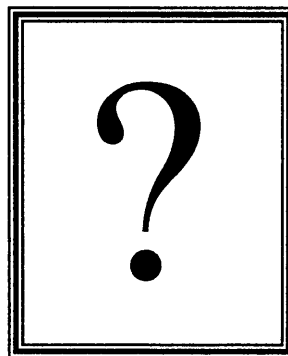
*against the principalities, against the powers, against the world rulers of this present darkness, against the spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places."* God has set before each of us a race to run in this competition with evil and all that opposes the will of God. Being a Christian is not about us, as Rick Warren reminds us, as much as it is about God. As believers were are called to serve God. We are to compete on his behalf. Paul says, *"I do it all for the sake of the gospel, that I may share in its blessings. Do you not know that in a race all the runners compete, but only one receives the prize? So run that you may obtain it. Every athlete exercises self-control in all things. They do it to receive a perishable wreath, but we an imperishable. Well, I do not run aimlessly, I do not box as one beating the air; but I pommel my body and subdue it, lest after preaching to others I myself should be disqualified."* 1 Cor. 9:23-27

God desires that we share in the blessing of the Gospel and receive the imperishable reward of our faith. He expects us to find our purpose for living in him. (Find out more about this in Rick Warren's book *The Purpose Driven Life*.) God invites us to be a part of his plan. Are we ready to be a part of that plan? Have we prepared ourselves to be spiritual athletes to honor our God and savior? That is what discipleship is all about.

Discipleship requires the same thing of us a coach or a team expects of any athlete. True believers know and study everything they can about their faith. Disciples are knowledgeable about the rules, techniques and strategy of faith needed to be victorious in or faith. We condition ourselves mentally, physically, and spiritually to be ready for anything that may be required of us. We also practice faith skills constantly. Then we put all of this to the test in actual ministry to the world where people oppose. In this process refine our witnessing skills and win the prize.

Few of us will ever become spiritual Olympians, but we can all be spiritual athletes. We do not have to be young and physically strong, but we must be faithful and strong in the faith. Sadly, all too many church members look more like a booster club than God's team to actually accomplish something in the world. Too many church members sit in the stands and or on the sidelines but never get into the game of Christian discipleship. All too many church members play arm-chair quarterbacks and talk about what should have been done by those who are actually carrying out God's plans for his church.

Following the outstanding gold medal win of the US Women's Softball Team at the Olympics, the winning pitcher was asked what she would attribute to their amazing record. She said that the key to their win was the ability to turn individually great players into a real team. They actually trained with navy seal teams to learn the meaning of teamwork.

Unfortunately, many Christians still think Christianity is primarily about individual faith rather than teamwork. In reality God is the Christian franchise owner, Jesus is our head coach and the Holy Spirit is the defensive coach. God expects all Christian to be players not spectators. Non-Christians are the spectators and sometimes our opponents. God does not need cheerleaders, but players to carry out his plans for the church and the world.

Just as we know what it takes to be a serious athlete, deep down we know what it takes to be a disciple. Most church members have decided that it requires way too much and our church suffers the consequences. St. Paul said, *"I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith."* II Tim. 4:7 Will we be able to say the same?

and started working with the state.

They joined St. Matthew's when Rev. Thomas Loftis was pastor. They later became a lay speaker in the church. ## *PRE-SCHOOL AND AFTER SCHOOL OUTREACH MINISTRIES*

Our ministry design team has been studying requirements for this ministry and surveying programs in the area to learn what will be needed to move forward. We have some preliminary plans that will be discussed at our next Ministry Council Meeting. We have concluded that much of the preparations we need to make for this ministry are things we ought to do for our own children already here at St. Matthew's. Dr. Hale has received a grant through his non-profit faith based 501 (c) (3) ministry of \$8,000-\$10,000 a year which can be used to assist us in our outreach to the community. That is enough to cover part of the salary of a Program Director and Scholarships for children and families in need. The ministry is called



# CHURCH IN SCHOOLS PROJECT

Our **One-By-One Ministry** has been in a partnership with J. W. Coon Elementary School for several years. Our Circles and United Methodist Women's ministries have helped in the school as well. This is a part of the Church In School Project of the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church.

This year the United Methodist Women allocated \$200 for back to school needs at J. W. Coon and partnered with The PEACE ministry that added another \$600 to the project. The administrators, teachers, social worker and counselor have been identifying needs since school has started. St. Matthew's can be proud of our ministry in this school partnership.

Through a grant The PEACE is also able to provide a \$25 gift a month to nine different classroom teachers to buy some extras that are needed for the children. If we could raise another \$300 dollars we could make a gift to each classroom over the next nine months. ## Faith In Action

Our partnership with the Department of Social Services we started under the name Families First continues its ministry under the name of Faith In Action. The ministry team went through training and is available to help families who are trying to move from welfare to work. We must admit that Bob and Adella Pray have done the vast majority of the work in this ministry. Others of us have been available to assist from time to time. This has been an extremely meaningful ministry which helps us fulfill **our vision for God's grace in Christ to transform our lives and Church through exciting, creative ministries that embody St. Matthew's 25 Challenge by faithfully serving the poor, hungry, naked, imprisoned, sick and strangers in our own community, as if ministering to Christ himself, for Jesus said, "As you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it unto me." Matthew 25:40**

### RECIPE OF THE MONTH

#### "BLUEBERRY STREUSEL COBBLER"

|   |                                    |
|---|------------------------------------|
| 1 pint fresh or frozen blueberries          | 1 (14 oz) can Eagle Brand Sweet    |
| 2 tsp grated lemon peel                     | Condensed Milk (NOT evaporated)    |
| 3/4 cup plus 2 Tbs cold butter or margarine | 2 cups biscuit baking mix, divided |
| 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar           | 1/2 cup chopped nuts               |
| Vanilla Ice Cream                           | Blueberry Sauce                    |

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. In bowl, combine blueberries, Eagle Brand and peel. In large bowl, cut 3/4 cup butter into 1 1/2 cups biscuit mix until crumbly; add blueberry mixture. Spread in greased 9-inch square baking pan. In small bowl, combine remaining 1/2 cup biscuit mix and sugar; cut in remaining 2 tablespoons butter until crumbly. Add nuts. Sprinkle over cobbler. Bake 1 hour and 10 minutes or until golden. Serve warm with vanilla ice cream and Blueberry Sauce. Refrigerate leftovers. Makes 8 to 12 servings.



**BLUEBERRY SAUCE:** In saucepan, combine 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon cornstarch, 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon and 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg. Gradually add 1/2 cup water. Cook and stir until thickened. Stir in 1 pint blueberries; cook and stir until hot.
